

Journey to Work Event

Journey to Work is an initiative presented by Amey in 2022 that sees Amey collaborate with local councils and key partners to connect local talent with employment opportunities within their communities.

These events go beyond job placements, offering enriching workshops, valuable CV writing and interview tips, and guidance on navigating the local job market. They also address broader issues affecting job seekers, such as wellbeing, financial management, resiliencebuilding, and stress alleviation.

To date, we have delivered 22 Journey to Work events, engaging with 867 unemployed individuals. Among them, 329 have actively attended CV skills and/ or interview skills workshops. We have successfully secured employment for 105 individuals and are continuing to support the remainder in their journey back to employment."

Over the past two months, we've hosted three J2W events - Dundee, Glasgow (15 secured an interview on the day) and a female prison in Kent (1 hired into Amey).




Animal Centre Volunteering

Staff at the centre were very impressed with the work that the team carried out as the grass was not an easy task to uplift. The team left due to adverse weather conditions with plans to return to offer more support and help.

SSPCA Visit

Media and Comms Graduate Kirsty Logan went along to one of the local SSPCA sites to identify what we can do to help support this vital charity. The SSPCA provide crucial support for the rescue and rehoming of various animals as well as advice and guidance on both wildlife and domestic animals.

The SSPCA also provide information on animals on wildlife on the road, including what to do if you should come across an animal on the road, especially high-speed motorways such as our trunk road networks and what you can do to prevent an accident.

Amey staff are currently in talks with the charity to help support their centres with maintenance work that is required for animals currently under their care before being released or rehomed. Works discussed include maintenance on their animal enclosures and aviaries.

DUNDEE CANCER RESEARCH

Cameron Martindale: "My friend and I took on the 10K Race for Life in Dundee in support of Cancer Research after my friends partners father recently passed away due to cancer. We both trained guite a bit leading up to the event though due to me being on holiday for two weeks immediately before, and it being a particularly hilly course it was particularly challenging. We were both happy with our times and I think in total raised about £500 for the charity."

FOOD BANK DONATIONS

Amey donated 41 items to the Trussell Trust Foodbank in Perth. Collections were made from Perth office in Caledonian House where members of staff donated a range of nonperishable food and drink items to the foodbank. The Trussell Trust Foodbank support a nationwide network of more than 1,300 food banks and provide emergency food and support to those facing hardships, while campaigning to end the need for foodbanks within the UK. The charities network provides a minimum of three days nutritionally balanced emergency food to those who have been referred and offer support and advice to help people lift

New Salt Barns and Gritters Helped Deliver 2023/24 Winter service

Ameys Winter service commenced at midnight of Sunday 1st October 2023 and continued through to midday on Wednesday 16th May 2024.

Amey had 40 new gritters ready to keep the trunk roads safe and clear. The 32-tonne, eight-wheeled vehicles in their distinctive bright orange livery some of the largest in the UK - became a regular sight on the north east trunk road network over the winter.

The winter service fleet were on standby 24-hoursa-day, seven days a week to respond and cover 593km of trunk roads and 151km of footpaths.

A new 9,000 tonne capacity salt barn at Amey's Kinross depot and 5,000 tonne salt barn at the Nairn depot also added increased resilience in tackling adverse weather conditions across the network.



Body Worn Cameras

Amey roadworkers across north-east Scotland have been fitted with new body-worn video cameras to enhance their safety and capture high-quality video evidence.

The small, lightweight cameras, which are visibly fitted to an operative's uniform, usually on the chest, will function as a visible deterrent and can be used to capture evidence of an incident and support investigations.

The roadside is one of the most dangerous places to work in the UK and, as well as operating in a high risk environment, roadworkers carrying out essential maintenance are often faced with unacceptable personal abuse from drivers who are angry at having to wait extra minutes at roadworks.

Whilst Amey has policies and procedures in place to help manage these risks against roadworkers, the use of body-worn video cameras will provide an additional support mechanism.
